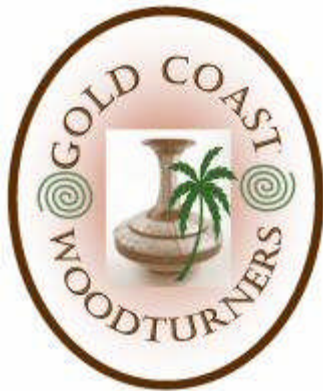

At the November meeting, I will call for nominations from the floor. I will then call for a vote on the slate of candidates. If there is no opposition we will just call a voice vote and not bother with secret ballots.

We will have one other item at the November meeting that will be put to a member vote. Tony Cortese mentioned to Ron Pursell during his visit that many of the Florida turning clubs have been contributing to the development of a successful turning program at the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranch. Tony's club has been providing mentors to complement the equipment donations. The program has been a huge success and demand has exceeded the available resources. Ron Pursell asked the GCWT Board to consider approving the donation of one of the club owned jet mini-lathes to the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranch

The board voted to support this request and to bring it to the membership for approval. We currently have 6 mini-lathes. We have never used all the lathes at any of our demonstrations or workshops. It's a shame to have equipment that isn't being fully utilized and this is an opportunity to put one of our underutilized lathes to good use. The GCWT Board recommends that you vote to approve this donation. Ron will be at the November meeting to explain the proposal and answer any questions. The club is in pretty good financial shape. We have about \$1,700 in the treasury and we will be collecting 2009 dues soon which will give the treasury a boost.

Don't forget that the December meeting is our annual Christmas party at Woodcraft. We request that everyone bring a covered dish (and serving utensil if needed) to share. The club will provide drinks, eating utensils, paper products and music. We will again be having a gift exchange. Participation is voluntary, but it's so much fun I don't know how anybody could pass it up. I'll review the exchange guidelines for our newer members:

1. If you bring a gift to exchange you will receive a ticket. During the meeting tickets will be drawn and the holder of the ticket will get to choose a gift.
2. Gifts should be something you have made yourself. It would be nice if it was turned and wood, but it doesn't have to be.
3. Gifts should be wrapped (or bagged / boxed / whatever) so it remains a surprise and the gifts should not have any identifying marks on wrapping (or bag / box / whatever) to identify who brought it. Remember some of the kids like to peek as the presents are being added to the pile so do what you can to maintain the mystery.
